Tēnā koutou ngā uri o Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki,

For the first time since the incorporation of NPKH in 1987, we are near the end of a gruelling process and have lost many magnificent tipuna along the way. Te Rūnanga o Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki are close to achieving the necessary milestone requirements to negotiate a Treaty Settlement with the Crown. The backbone of our negotiation is almost complete at no cost to our Iwi. We are still the largest Māori Land owning Iwi in the Hauraki. To our knowledge, no Hauraki Iwi have settled to date. We are in the process of building our systemic capability and capacity. We have come a long way since our first Trustees signed off on our constitution in 1988. Our negotiators, Trustees (on consecutive Trusts) and researchers have worked over many years to arrive at this stage of our settlement journey.

Having secured an Agreement in Principle (AIP) with the Crown, we need iwi support to establish a Post Settlement Governance Entity (PSGE). A PSGE needs to be legally capable of receiving our Treaty Settlement assets. Having a PSGE, positions Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki with the best possible chance to secure a settlement within this generation. Achieving a treaty settlement will help futureproof the next generation. This is your opportunity to have your say and vote 'Yes' on our new Post-Settlement Governance Entity.



Executive Summary

This document has been prepared by the Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki Inc (“the Trust”). It explains the proposed Post Settlement Governance Entity (“PSGE”) for Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki. We need Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki members to ratify (support) the PSGE so we can receive future settlement assets on behalf of our iwi.

The Trust has prepared this document to provide Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki whānui with the opportunity to understand the details and structure of the proposed PSGE.

Six Information hui will be held online and around the country from Saturday 21 May to Saturday 28 May. This is an opportunity for iwi members to discuss the proposed PSGE with the Trust and ask any questions.

The proposed PSGE is a private Trust called Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki Rūnanga Trust.



Background

The people of Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki are pre-fleet people and trace our origins, from Nukutaimemeha, Tohora and Horouta in connection with Hauraki. As descendants of Maui Tikitiki-a-Taranga, Toi Te Huatahi and Paikea, our whakapapa and connection to Hauraki are both ancient and current as we continue to maintain ahi kaa. Our famed tipua Paikea-Ariki-Moana also named Harataunga, Te Ara Hou.

Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki have a wide cultural footprint throughout the Hauraki region. Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki iwi whakapapa to the Tipuna listed on our website (see our Register page online at www.npkhrunanga.com).



Introduction

The mandated negotiators for Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki have been negotiating with the Crown since 2009 on the historical claims and customary interests of Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki.

We are at the stage where we need to establish a legal entity acceptable to the Crown and capable of receiving and managing Treaty Settlement redress.

This entity is known as a Post-Settlement Governance Entity (“**PSGE**”).

Redress includes shares and accumulated dividends in Mercury NZ. In 2013, Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki accepted an option to acquire shares in Mighty River Power (now Mercury NZ) as part of the Government Share offer to yet-to-settle iwi. These shares and accumulated dividends have been held in trust by the Public Trust. These shares and dividends now need to be transferred to a Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki PSGE.

Hard copies of the Trust Deed will be available for public viewing at the Te Puni Kōkiri regional offices in Auckland and Hamilton.

The mandated negotiators for Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki, Fred Thwaites and John Tamihere, will continue to be the mandated negotiators for Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki during the ongoing Treaty negotiations with the Crown. Specific settlement redress is still under negotiation with the Crown. Registered adult members of Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki will be asked to vote on the settlement redress that is still under negotiation once those negotiations are complete.




Negotiations Process

Te Rūnanga o Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki Incorporated (the Trust) was constituted in a Hui a Iwi on the 2nd of September 2006.

The Deed of Mandate for Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki, was recognised by the Crown on 29th of June 2011.

The Trust signed Terms of Negotiation with the Crown in Jan 2016.



The 12 iwi of Hauraki framed an agreement with the Hauraki Collective in 2010.


The Trust reached an Agreement in Principle with the Crown on 22 July 2011.

The Trust continues discussions with the Crown regarding the full details of the Deed of Settlement to be initialled by the Trust, and ratified by the iwi, at a later date.

The Treaty Settlement Process



We Have ONE Resolution to Vote on

Approve our Post-Settlement Governance Entity (PSGE)

Why set up a PSGE?

Before Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki can receive any settlement assets from the Crown, a PSGE must be established. The PSGE must meet the Crown's requirements and be ratified by Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki iwi members. The Crown does not consider Charitable Trusts or Incorporated Societies as suitable PSGEs. Our previous constitution was a Charitable Trust, and our current Trust is an Incorporated Society so it is not able to be the PSGE for Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki and a new entity must be created.

Why ratify the PSGE now?

Before settlement redress can be transferred to an iwi, the legal structure of a PSGE must be established. The Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki Treaty settlement has not been completed and a Deed of Settlement has not been finalised. The main benefits of ratifying the PSGE before knowing the details of the settlement are early preparation and legal status.

The sooner a PSGE is established, the more time there is to prepare the entity for the receipt of redress. Normally a PSGE is ratified at the same time as the Deed of Settlement (when the completed settlement is signed off), which means the iwi must begin to operate the Entity almost immediately. Ratifying the PSGE sooner provides Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki with an opportunity to set up the necessary systems, people, processes and subsidiaries in preparation for receiving settlement redress allowing us to 'hit the ground running.'

Legal status

Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki Inc is the current entity with the mandate to negotiate with the Crown for the settlement of all tribal Treaty of Waitangi claims. A formal PSGE as a recognised legal entity can undertake tasks the current Incorporation cannot do for the benefit of all members of Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki. One example is entering into formal relationships with third parties ahead of any final settlement such as the Ministry for Culture and Heritage or the Department of Conservation as Government agencies.

Why do we need a new PSGE and Trust deed?

The Crown has developed a new standard Trust Deed for individual iwi settlements. A new Trust Deed must be established that is fit-for-purpose and meets the Crown's policy requirements. This is a normal part of the settlement process and will enable Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki to receive its redress once the settlement becomes law.

The proposed PSGE

The proposed PSGE is a private legal trust named "Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki Rūnanga Trust." Other forms of Governance Entity such as Charitable Trusts, Incorporated Societies, Land Trusts and Companies are not deemed appropriate for managing settlement redress.

The following sections provide a brief outline of the key features of the "Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki Runanga Trust" to help you make an informed choice on whether this PSGE will be beneficial to Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki. Further details of the points outlined below can be found in the full Trust Deed on our website: www.npkhrunanga.com.

Purpose of the Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki Rūnanga Trust

The main purpose of the Trust is to receive, hold and administer Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki settlement assets for present and future generations following the resolution of Treaty of Waitangi claims with the Crown. These settlement assets must be used to advance the people of Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki in accordance with four key pou (cultural identity, environmental kaitiakitanga, social wellbeing and economic development).

Further details regarding the Trust's powers and restrictions are available in the Trust Deed.





Development and structure of the proposed Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki PSGE

The Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki mandated negotiators have undertaken extensive work and sought legal advice to develop a suitable Trust Deed for the proposed PSGE.

The structure of the proposed Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki PSGE is a private Trust. This structure has been used by many iwi to receive and manage their Treaty of Waitangi settlements. The private trust structure is also the Crown's preferred structure. The proposed Trust Deed has been signed off by Te Arawhiti.

For the proposed PSGE to be established it must have sufficient support from Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki. We encourage you to make your vote count.

What happens to Te Rūnanga o Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki?

Te Rūnanga o Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki and the associated NPKH Trust will remain in place until our Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki people decide it is no longer required.

Trustees of the Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki Rūnanga Trust

There will be a minimum of five (5) and a maximum of seven (7) Trustees for the Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki Rūnanga Trust. The Trustees will be responsible for the overall governance of the Trust. The Trustees will act on behalf of all Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki in managing the settlement redress received by Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki through robust decision-making processes.

Initial Trustees

The initial Trustees will be:

- Frederick Hata Thwaites
- Maria Mareroa
- John Henry Tamihere
- Bevan Hunter
- Quentin Mark Potae
- Diane Tuari

Three (3) of the initial Trustees will retire on the date of the third annual general meeting (AGM) after the settlement of our historical claims. At this time, an election will be held for four (4) trustee positions giving us seven (7) Trustees. The Trustees elected at this point will be appointed for a term of three years. The remaining three (3) initial Trustees will retire on the date of the third annual general meeting following the settlement of our historical claims. At this time a general election will be held for all seven (7) trustee positions. The Trustees elected at this point will be appointed for a term of three years.



Nominations for Trustee Positions

Registered adult members (aged 18 years and over) of Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki will be able to nominate people for election as a Trustee. Any registered adult member of Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki is eligible for nomination to be elected as a Trustee, subject to section 3 and Schedule 2 in the Trust Deed.

The Trust will give notice calling for nominations (at least 3 months before the AGM) for the Trust for that financial year with sufficient time for an election. An election will be publicised by a range of methods including: post, email, advertisement, website and social media.

A nomination will need to be in writing and signed by at least two registered adult members of Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki. The consent of the nominee will need to be endorsed on the nomination paper. Nominations must be lodged with the Trust within 21 days of the first notice that calls for nominations.

Election of Trustees

Adult registered members of Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki will be entitled to elect the Trustees. Voting will be by way of secret ballot.

Elections will be held as required when the term of a Trustee ends, or a vacancy arises. With the exception of the initial Trustees and the Trustees elected at the first election (following the settlement of our historical claims), the term of office for the Trustees will be three years. Trustees will be eligible for re-election.

The Trust will provide at least 28 days' notice of an election of Trustees and how votes may be made. Notice will be given by post or email, by newspaper, or through the Trust's website and social media.

Subsidiary Bodies

The Trust may establish subsidiaries to assist with the management of Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki assets. Any subsidiary must manage the Trust assets it owns and holds for the benefit of Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki. The Trustees of any subsidiary of the Trust will be appointed by the Trust.



Transparency and Accountability to the Members of Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki

The Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki Rūnanga Trust will be accountable to Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki iwi.

The Trust will prepare an annual plan each year covering (among other things):

- the annual objectives of the Trust.
- the nature and scope of activities proposed by the Trust.
- the ratio of capital to total assets.
- the performance targets and measurements by which the performance of the Trust may be judged.
- the proposed manner for dealing with projected income; and
- any proposals for ongoing management of the Trust's assets.

The Trust will also prepare a Five-Year Strategic Plan, to be updated at least every two years, setting out the longer-term vision of the Trust.

The Trust will be required to hold an annual general meeting (AGM) for the members of Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki. At each AGM the Trust will be required, among other things, to:

- report on the operation of the Trust (and any subsidiaries) during the previous year;
- present the Annual Report and audited consolidated financial statements; and
- present the proposed annual plan.

Notice of an AGM will be given to all registered adult members at least 28 days in advance of the meeting by post or email. Notice of an AGM will also be placed in relevant metropolitan and provincial newspapers.

At an AGM, registered adult members of Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki will be entitled to vote on resolutions to approve the remuneration of the Trustees.

Adult registered members of Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki will also be entitled to vote on any special resolutions. A special resolution will be required to approve:

- a major transaction.
- amendment of the Trust Deed.
- a resettlement of the Trust's assets.
- the termination of the Trust; and
- the disposal of Fisheries Settlement Assets (should these have been transferred to the Trust).

Special resolutions must be approved by at least 75% of the adult registered members of Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki who cast a valid vote in relation to that special resolution. Special general meetings may also be convened in addition to the AGM in accordance with the provisions of the Trust Deed. One reason for holding a special general meeting will be the consideration of a special resolution.

VOTING OPTIONS

You can vote in any of the following ways:

Online Vote

- Visit our website: www.npkhrunanga.com
- Follow the link and voting instructions
- Enter your PIN number and password on your Voting Paper

Postal Vote

- Tick “Āe/Yes” or “Kao/No” next to the resolution on your Voting Paper.
- Send your Voting Paper on the Freepost envelope.
- Postal Votes must be date stamped on or before the closing date Friday 17 June and received within 3 days of the closing date to be valid.

Ballot at the Information Hui

- Bring your Voting Paper to the Information Hui.
- Place your completed voting paper in the Ballot Box provided at our hui.

Make your vote count.

The voting process and rules are:

- All adult registered members (aged 18 and over) of Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki descent are eligible to vote and are encouraged to do so.
- Each voter can only vote once.
- There will be No proxy voting.
- Votes must be cast within the voting period (Thursday 12 May to Friday 17 June).
- The Independent Returning Officer must be able to match your voting number (unique identifier) with your details on the Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki register.
- Unregistered adult members of Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki descent, can register at the hui and cast a Special Vote using a Special Voting pack.

Special Voting Pack

(for new registrations or non registered whānau)

If you are not yet registered, you can still vote by:

- i) Completing an iwi registration form (to verify your whakapapa and voting eligibility). Special votes will need to be verified by our whakapapa committee to be counted.
- ii) Submitting your vote using a special voting pack online or at our ratification information hui.

What if I'm not registered with Te Rūnanga ō Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki?

If you are over 18 years old and whakapapa to one or more tipuna on our list, you are eligible to register (see our Register page online at www.npkhrunanga.com). Whāngai and legally adopted whānau members are also eligible to register.

Register your whānau

Even though they will not be eligible to vote at this time, we encourage you to register all whānau including tamariki and mokopuna under 18 years old.

What if I live overseas?

You can vote! If you are a registered member over 18 years old and live overseas, we strongly recommend you vote. You can attend any of our online hui and vote online during our voting period. How to join our register

You can register on our website at: www.ngpkhrunanga.com or fill out a registration form at any of our information hui and submit your vote on a Special Voting Pack (see page 14).

Who runs the voting process and outcome?

The voting process, including the helpline, is led by an independent voting company called *electionz.com*. *electionz.com* appointed Anthony Morton as the Independent Returning Officer. His job is to authenticate the votes and he has final judgement on the validity of the votes. Isaiah Roberts is the Deputy Returning Officer.



What happens after the vote?

1	Once voting has closed and the votes have been counted by electionz.com, the Independent Returning Officer advises Te Rūnanga o Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki of the results.
2	Te Rūnanga o Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki then advises Te Puni Kokiri (TPK) and Te Arawhiti.
3	Te Arawhiti and TPK report to the Minister of Treaty of Waitangi Negotiations and Minister for Māori Development. They advise the Ministers of the robust and independent process that encouraged full participation of the members.
4	The Ministers will advise Te Rūnanga o Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki if they consider the voting results show sufficient support from Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki for the resolution.

Voting Outcome

To progress our settlement with the Crown, we need as many registered adult Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki members as possible to participate in the voting process. If the Crown considers that enough members participate in the voting process, and sufficient majority of those who participate vote in support of the PSGE proposal then the Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki Rūnanga Trust can be established. If the PSGE proposal is not ratified (i.e., not accepted by the voters) then Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki and the Crown will need to reassess the PSGE proposal.

Benefits of Keeping the Same Trustees

We are at an important part of our settlement journey, and we are close to reaching a draft Deed of Settlement for you to vote on.

The existing Te Rūnanga o Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki Trustees have a strong understanding of our Treaty Settlement. Keeping the existing Rūnanga Trustees will ensure we don't lose momentum in our negotiations.

To be effective, it is important that Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki Rūnanga Trust continues with our current strategic and negotiation tactics. Most of the Trustees have institutional knowledge of our progress and we are likely to achieve a Deed of Settlement our Iwi can celebrate.



Members Register

The Trust must maintain the member's Register that lists the name, date of birth, postal address, email address and identification number of every registered member of Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki.

Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki members can access their own personal details on the member's Register and those of their children under the age of 18 years. However, they are not entitled to access the details of any other Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki member unless they have the written permission of that member. This is a legal requirement under the Privacy Act 1993.

The Trust must appoint a Membership Committee that contains up to three Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki members with whakapapa expertise. This committee will process the application forms received by the Trust to become a registered member of Ngāti Porou ki Hauraki and make decisions around registration and access to the Member's Register.
